

Latest Happenings In the Diocese: The Passionists: 60 years of Service to Jamaica

It was on April 1, 1955, in response to a request for Missionaries for Jamaica, by the then Archbishop of Kingston John J. McEleney S.J. to the Passionist General Superior in Rome, that the Passionists of St. Paul of the Cross Province first arrived in the island sixty years ago. Fr Cormac

Shanahan, C.P.and Fr. Callistus Connolly C.P. immediately began Pastoral care of St. Elizabeth's Church and St. Peter Claver Church in Kingston. Fr. Canisius Hazlett C.P, Fr. William Whelan, C.P. and Fr. Anthony Feeherry C.P. came to serve in Mandeville, which became the headquarters for the Regional Superi-

or and the place where all the Passionists gathered for their monthly get-together.

The Passionists quickly set about restoring and building churches, and opening schools and health clinics in Kingston as well as in what is now the Diocese of Mandeville.

Brother Michael Stomber, C.P. came to Jamaica in 1959 with a mechanical background and was integrally involved in the building of rectories and churches in those early days. He left Jamaica in 1970 and returned in 1990 after serving briefly as a bush pilot for the Bishop of Guyana. Today, at the age of 87, he assists with

the care of infirmary and hospital patients and devotes himself to prayer.

In 1973, Fr. Martin Tooker C.P. became the first Retreat Director of the Mount Calvary Retreat House. Since he could not drive, he spent his first days in Mandeville riding around on a bread delivery truck to get to know the people. The gracious at-

mosphere which characterizes the Retreat House is the lasting gift of Fr. Martin. Over the years, Mount Calvary has become known to Jamaicans all over the island as a haven for spiritual renewal.

In 1978, Fr. Thomas Brislin, C.P. took over direction of the Ministry briefly until Fr. Martin once again returned to Mount Calvary in 1980.

In September 1985, the priests invited the Passionist Sisters to

come to Jamaica for ministry. Sr. Bernadette Hughes, C.P. thus became the new Director of the Retreat House, bringing her expertise and training in spiritual direction and retreat

ministry. Two other Passionist Sisters, Sr. Joanne Fahey C.P. and Sr. Kathleen Mary Burke C.P. also came to Mandeville for Pastoral and Catechetical ministries. The Sisters built a convent next to the Retreat Centre.

In 1987, Fr. Paul Zilonka, C.P. joined Sr. Bernadette as co-director of Mount Calvary while teaching at the seminary in Kingston. He concluded his ministry in Jamaica

and returned to the USA in July 1995.

Gradually, the Passionists began to develop a vocation program, and actively seek local vocations. Bertram Chin was thus ordained on June 30, 1991 becoming the first Jamai-

can Passionist priest and subsequently the first Jamaican Provincial Vicar. When he passed away in Sept

2003, he had already touched many lives with his brief ministry.

Bishop Paul M. Boyle, C.P.

A week after the ordination of Fr. Bertram Chin, C.P., Bishop Paul M. Boyle, C.P. former superior general of the Passionist Congregation , was appointed as the first bishop of the newly created Apostolic Vicariate of Mandeville on July 9, 1991.

In 1993, Sr. Una O'Connor C.P. came to Jamaica to focus on educational ministry in the Diocese. She started an evening college program for eighteen basic school teachers, with the help of a dedicated staff of professional teachers at St. Paul of the Cross School. The small group of committed educators and students was the founding nucleus of the Catholic College of Mandeville.

The College outgrew its space, relocating to Caledonia Road in 2001 and finally to its current Williamsfield campus in 2013. In 2014, Sr. Una retired as president of the College, having overseen its growth and development from its first small class of students to its largest enrollment of approximately 700 students and 80 full and part-time faculty and staff in 2010.

Under the direction of Fr. Lucian Clark, C.P. who resides in the USA, the first group of Passionist Volunteers arrived in Jamaica in September 2003. The Volunteers are recent graduates from U.S. Colleges who want to combine Catholic social teaching

in a faith-rooted and community based experience. Their early ministry would serve the churches of Stony Hill, outside of Kingston. In 2010, the volunteers moved their focus to The Diocese of Mandeville, providing assistance in the areas of health and education according to their skills and expertise.

After the retirement of Bishop Paul Boyle, C.P in July 2004, Bishop Gordon Bennett, S.J. became the 2nd bishop of Mandeville. He retired in August 2006. Bishop Charles Dufour was then named Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese until Bishop Neil Tiedemann, C.P., now the current Bishop, was appointed third Bishop of Mandeville in May 2008.



In addition to a Passionist Bishop, there are currently six Passionist priests, a Brother, and two Sisters in the Diocese, as well as Fr. Richard Award, C.P. who came to Jamaica in 1985 and spent some time as pastor of St. Paul of the Cross and who now resides and serves in Kingston at St. Elizabeth Church.

Fr. Paul Ruttle, C.P. came to Jamaica in 2008 and became the rector of St. Paul of the Cross Cathedral in Mandeville. Fr. Michael Rowe, C.P. is a Jamaican priest who was ordained in 2011 in Mandeville, and was assigned to the

Retreat Ministry at Mount Calvary Retreat House. He is also involved in St. Paul of the Cross Cathedral.

Most recently, in 2014, Fr. James Price, C.P. came to Jamaica from the USA to head the Evangelization Team in the Diocese, followed some months later by Fr. Paschal Cuthina, C.P., Fr. Benzen Devassykutty, C.P and Fr. Xavier Valiaparambil, C.P from India, who have formed a Passionist House in May Pen. They attend to the Pastoral Care of St. Thomas More Church in May Pen.

The people of Mandeville truly owe a great deal to the Passionists for their immense contribution over the past sixty years. The Passionists will always hold a special place in the hearts of the people as they continue to work together for the glory of God and the continued development of the Diocese of Mandeville and the people of Jamaica.
